You may want to take advantage of one of those fast dwindling sunny days by taking an excursion to a museum. No doubt New Jersey has a very fine inventory of art and cultural venues but there are also some places nearby that can make for an interesting day. MOMA (53rd St.) in NYC is set for their grand reopening. The museum has been remodeled and will unveil their new surroundings on October 21st. Another interesting trip, although not an art museum, is the Tenement Museum (97 Orchard St.) in the city where you can tour restored tenement apartments of the 19th and 20th century and see how immigrants, struggling to get their piece of the American dream, lived, worked and raised their families. You should order tickets in advance if you plan to go, (www.tenement.org). If you think you have enough culture, and want to visit some places on the not so serious side, The Museum of the American Gangster (78 St. Marks Pl.), also in the city may be a diversion; or a trip to New Berlin, N.Y. to the Golden Artist Paint Factory to see watercolor and acrylic paints being made (see tourguides@Goldenpaints.com) for times and dates of tours will fill the day. But best of all, opening this fall in SOHO, (no opening date published yet) will be The Museum of Ice Cream. There is one in San Francisco... but that's little too far for a day trip.

Do you Giclée?

If you reproduce your artwork for sale or display you most likely use an archival printer that specializes in Giclée printing (zhee-klay, a French word "to squirt or spurt") to create a reproduction exactly like your original. The advent of this method of printing can create resolution much higher than lithographs, (the previous method), and less light sensitive, so the inks of the reproduction resist fading up to 50 years or more. The giclée process starts with the printer taking a "capture" (or picture) of the original art with a high-resolution camera and stores the image on a computer (server) in a digital file. *There is usually a separate fee charged by the printer for this part of the process. The image is transferred by sophisticated computer software to an inkjet printer that uses a water or solvent based ink. In the process, a fine stream of pigmented ink – more than four million droplets per second – is sprayed onto archival paper or canvas.

Each piece is carefully hand mounted onto a drum which rotates during printing. Exact calculations of hue, value, and density ,direct the ink of four nozzles to produce a combination of 512 chromatic changes, (with over 3 million colors possible) of highly saturated, non-toxic ink. Your printer should get your approval, as the artist, by giving you a "proof" of the reproduction and making any corrections before continuing with the final edition. Before selecting an archive printer, do some research. First make sure the shop specializes in printing fine art. Ask your fellow artists who they use and if the printer is reliable, (i.e. are they schedule conscious, easy to work with, and most of all, have the latest equipment). The technology is forever changing and ask when the printer last upgraded their hardware and software. Also, most local archive printers have a maximum image size they can print, usually 48 to 54" wide including borders. Any wider you will have to search for a large commercial archive printing firm. The cost for your giclée is usually based on the square foot of the finished reproduction, which differs between paper and canvas, and is slightly more if you want a coating (varnish) applied. And yes, the s/f cost is based on the image plus the size of the unprinted border.

However, once the giclée is made, reproduced on canvas or paper, you can bet it will be just as good as the original, showing brush strokes and all. You can reproduce your art as needed as your printer has the corrected digital file you approved saved on their server. * The printer should also provide you a disc for the original capture they do for you at no extra charge. Archived prints are usually numbered by the order the print was produced of the total number. That is labeling the print as "1/25" would designate that print is the first of 25 produced, 2/25 the second, and so on up to the 25th. Some printers also provide you a certificate that you can label and attach to the back of the print or give the purchaser.
